The welfare of our students should be a priority, and this is one way we can make it a priority.



Capital Project: New Audio/Visual Desk & System

Curious about the work at the back of the Sanctuary? If you've attended a recent service, I'm sure you've noticed some changes. However, by the time you are reading this, we will truly be in the

thick of the installation process for our new A/V system. We are first working on the utility aspect of the installation - getting all the equipment online and usable - but it will still take time over the coming weeks and months to get the whole project refined and finished. It is a really big change and a really big project so thank you in advance for your patience as all the pieces of this process come together!

Why upgrade? We want the technology to blend seamlessly into the worship experience. It should enhance not detract from worship, and our old system has been clunky and obvious. We've continuously cobbled together new elements as we've added the live stream, more power point presentations, and teleprompting over the past few years. Technology also ages very quickly, and we've simply run up against all the limits of our old A/V system.

WHAT IS BEING UPGRADED?

- 1. **THE DESK**. FCUCC member, **Larry Patzer**, is building us a new desk that will house all the equipment plus provide workspace for up to three volunteers. It is a much larger piece of furniture than we are used to seeing at the back of the Sanctuary. In order to make space for it, we will be removing one additional pew.
- 2. **THE CAMERAS.** Instead of wobbly, unsightly cameras impeding two thirds of our wheelchair accessible spaces, we will have three new cameras mounted up on the walls of the Sanctuary, out of sight. The cameras will also give a crisp, clear picture for the viewers at home.
- 3. **THE SOUND SYSTEM.** Our audio capabilities are expanding and upgrading to current technology. We want to ensure that our equipment can adequately accommodate all of our biggest events at FCUCC like Music Presentation, Folk, and Jazz Sundays.
- 4. **THE PROJECTOR.** Long story short our old projector is dying. It's fuzzy and dim. Occasionally it's green. It's outdated. And it's no longer serviceable. We are upgrading to a laser projector which will better cut through the ambient light streaming in the stained glass windows.
- 5. **FOUNDERS' ROOM TELEVISION.** Our goal is to add the live stream view to the Founders' Room so that anyone viewing from up there can also see the Chancel. It will also be used during music rehearsals, memorials, and for other technical needs.
- 6. **THE NURSERY**. We are going to add an audio feed of the service to the Nursery. This will add a layer of security in communication from one side of the building to the other so that the children's area can receive automatic notification of anything, including emergencies, that may occur. It has the added benefit of allowing the nursery workers to listen in on the worship service as they're able.

Why now? **Kris Anderson**, who was a member of First Congregational Church for fifty years, joining in May 1962 at the age of thirteen, left a bequest to the church. She passed away in May 2022. Her generosity has made it possible to do this capital project without needing to pull from the church reserves nor run a capital campaign to raise the needed funds. Kris joined The Seven Pillars Fellowship in 2010. We are so grateful to honor her legacy and continue to commit to our mission and ministry as a church through this project.

The Seven Pillars Fellowship, named for the seven pillars holding up our Front Portico, welcomes all church members and friends who name First Congregational as a beneficiary of their will or estate plan. Beyond this criteria, there are no other requirements to joining The Seven Pillars Fellowship. Lastly, I want to offer a huge thank you to the team that has been working on this project for over a year. We are led by the very capable and knowledgeable, **Paul Schwotzer**. Other members include Sid Shelton, Carolyn Dickerson, Dave Morgan, the church Moderator – Bill Kemp and then Rich Law, and Rev. Lee Ann Bryce. There have been other several people who have weighed in, advised, and done work as well – thank you to all of you.

Church Financial Audit for Calendar Year 2022

On July 20, the Church audit results for 2022 were presented by Erickson, Brown & Kloster, LLC (EBK) to the Church Council and the Financial Advisory Committee.

Council approved EBK as the Church Financial Auditor through 2026 after a review of bids from four audit companies. Audits are important to ensure that the Church finances are in order according to generally accepted account principles (GAAP) and can suggest ways to improve our accounting methods and financial security.

The audit company worked with our accounting firm (Crystal Clear Solutions, LLC) and **Rachel Rumple** to review financial statements and have inquiries answered. We prepared a Management Representation Letter for them describing our financial structures, asset ownership, and declaring there is no pending or threatened litigation against the Church.

I am happy to report that there were no significant findings for this Review Audit and that EBK is not aware of any material modifications that should be made to the Church Financial statements for 2022. There will be another Review Audit for 2023 followed by a Full Audit in 2024, then Review Audits for 2025 and 2026.



BE-coming...

A new ADULT offering for ALL ages on Sunday mornings – hey, we invite YOU to "Be-come" with us, to build together ... over FCC's program year.

WHAT IS THIS?

This is a casual, multi-generational, multi-sensory, group bonding, ALL in, coffee-minded, community-building, spirit-minded opportunity that may entail some meditation, humor, music, poetry and most of all, YOUR VOICE.

WHEN IS THIS?

It will begin on September 17, alongside the various Faith Formation Hour offerings for children and youth, and The Forum. That means, we will meet after the 10 a.m. worship service, in the Gregg Library... with coffee! WHO IS GUIDING THIS?

Over the fall, a squad of facilitators, including **Del Hokanson**, **Nancy Law**, **John Felps**, and **Lisa November**, will guide sessions, in the hope that as we "BE-Come" more in tune with the desires of the participants, more participants may want to engage as the visioning team.

WHAT DOES THE FALL SESSION LOOK LIKE?

December 3, 10, 17, 24: Our Advent program will be based on the salt project's E.E. Cummings and The Joyful Poetry of Advent

In honoring the purpose of "BE-coming" we will see how themes and ideas evolve over the year, in response to what EACH OF YOU BRING as we "BE-come" together.



Below are a few examples of Krista Tippett's guidance for us, based on five themes: Words, Flesh, Love, Faith, and Hope.

- The point is we need to have "conversations across time and generations, across disciplines and denominations...a cartography of wisdom about our emerging world."
- This is an opportunity "for people who want to take up the great questions of our time with imagination and courage, to nurture new realities in the spaces we inhabit, and to do so expectantly and with JOY."
- "Our spiritual lives are where we reckon head on with the mysteries of ourselves, and the mystery of each other."
- "Our questions are intimate and civilizational all at once definitions of when life begins and
 when death happens; the meaning of marriage and family and identity; of our relationship to
 the natural world; of our relationship to technology and our relationship through technology."

Creation Justice Discernment is Underway

As our earth faces unprecedented change, our church is exploring what possibilities will emerge when we come together as a congregation to imagine and implement a responsible way forward to living sustainably and reverently.



On May 7, our church made a commitment to begin the discernment process to determine whether to become a Creation Justice Church as defined by the UCC. Although the steps laid

out by the UCC inform our work as we move through the year, each congregation is encouraged to find their unique calling. We are operating from the core belief in building community and getting to know one another while we learn about the many facets of how we can contribute to creation justice is key.

To lay the foundation for building a vital community a survey was sent out inviting members to share and rank interest in various environmental/creation justice issues. From more than 160 survey responses individuals shared questions, heart-felt concerns as well as several offering suggestions, ideas and resources. Based on what we learned, the Creation Justice Leadership Team offered several activities during the summer:

- a tour to the Denver Botanic Gardens.
- a visit to **Barb and Mike McAdams**' organic vegetable and flower gardens.
- a visit to **Jan Erickson** and **Jon Thomas**' permaculture gardens and a first-hand look at their solar energy, heat pumps for water, cooling and heating as well as how they use rainwater for irrigation.
- a visit to Food to Power, a community garden and composting site located in the Hillside neighborhood.
- an all church reading of *Cathedral on Fire*, a church handbook for the climate crisis written by UCC minister Brooks Berndt. Over fifty copies of this book were purchased. At the time of this writing, one spirited discussion has already been moderated by **Dave Seyfert** and **Lisa November** with a second scheduled for August 23. Feedback indicates that more book group discussions would be welcome. Watch for these...

As we move through this time of discernment, we will continue to focus on building a supportive community while learning and discovering what we are each personally and collectively called to BE.

Earth Holders: *A Meditation, Writing and Walking Series* will be offered by Lisa November, Ceil Malek, and Emerson Hauber. Beginning September 26, this gathering will take place in the Carey Chapel on the second and fourth Tuesday of the month through the fall (6 p.m. - 7 p.m.).

Potluck and Film Series: For five consecutive Friday nights beginning October 6, the Creation Justice Team will host a 6 p.m. Potluck Supper in the Founders' Room to precede our fall film series. The potluck will showcase food raised sustainably and prepared nutritiously. The films (chosen by **Bob** and **Karen Jones** and **Jerry White**) will begin at 7 p.m. in the Sanctuary, and will explore different aspects of our complicated relationships with the natural world and eachother, how human activities are damaging the earth, and consider opportunities to treat creation, and each other, more justly.

Peek in the Past: 100 Years

FCUCC's centennial celebration wasn't as elaborate as the 75 years' full week of activities had been, but the occasion spawned some memorable creations. I already wrote about the "Raising the Roof Cookbook," published by the Women's

Circles, which probably covered the cost of the festivities. The other publication was "First Congregational Church of Colorado Springs, Colorado. The First One Hundred Years 1874-1974," wherein our first appointed historian, Mary Elizabeth Burgess, assisted by Wanetta Draper, painted a picture of our church's first 100 years from Prof. Gregg's memoirs, Manly Ormes' earlier summaries, and her own scrapbooks and recollections.

The culmination came with the Centennial Sunday Service, led by recently installed young pastor Rev. Jerry M. Jordan. A Centennial Committee, led by Betty Lindeman, had

coordinated the service, inviting the **Rev. Herbert Hosanna** to hold the Greeting from the Rocky Mountain Conference and previous pastor Rev. Edward Manthei to preach the sermon ("Past, Present and Future"). The flowers had been given by Louise and Mary Elizabeth Burgess in memory of their grandparents, Frederick and Maria Martin, founding members of the church.

Other noticeable contributions came from the Chancel Choir, expanded with a group from Colorado College, (Mozart's "Gloria"), Martha Booth (Bach's "My heart ever faithful"), and organist Judy McGuire (Vierne's "Pastorale"). The Congregation sang "For the Glory and the Beauty" a new hymn by Roy Bramwell on the tune of "Glorious Things of Thee are Spoken," sung at the establishment of the church in 1874. It is still in use on our anniversaries.

The 50+ year members of that day were recognized and our longer term congregants may still recall some of them: Mrs. Alfred L. Brown (1907), Clara Perley (1907), Louise Martin Burgess (1909), Frances W. Zimmerman (1917), Mrs. William H. (Alice Allen) Preston (1919), Marjorie Davis (1918), Mary Elizabeth Burgess (1920), Sophia Parker (1920), Joan Wells (1922), and Mrs. J. Donald (Gratia Belle) Haney (1923).

After the service, concluded with the hymn "Our God, our help in ages past," a birthday celebration was held in the Founders' Room. The back of the program featured a somewhat modified text from the Record Book of FCC's First Clerk: "At a meeting on Sunday afternoon, October 25, 1874,... Haney in historical costume on Historical Sunday, the Sacrament was administered and a Congregational Church was formally organized with the (23) names already received."

General Church Council Expectations:

Fundraising

FCUCC Council Members will pledge to the church and act as leaders in the importance of giving to the church. This will include participating in annual campaign phone calls and conversations with members about giving. So that FCUCC can credibly solicit contributions from foundations, organizations, and individuals, FCUCC expects to have 100 percent of Council Members make an annual pledge that is prayerfully considered and reflects commitment to the church.



Council Terms and Participation

Council positions are approved by a vote of the Congregation at the Annual Meeting. Council members will serve a three-year term. Monthly Council meetings usually begins with a meal shared together and Council members provide dinner for the rest of the Council one time during the year. Meetings are on the second Thursday of each month from 6 p.m. – 9 p.m., plus pre-meeting preparation time.

- Non-profit board experience is appreciated and desired, but not required.
- Good listener and reflector with appreciation of the importance of communication and candor

- Personal qualities of integrity, credibility, and a passion for the vision and mission of FCUCC.
